DID YOU KNOW THAT...?

- Salamanca has been a UNESCO **World Heritage** City since 1988. A renowned tourist destination, and the most visited city in Castille-León.
- It hosts over **30,000 university students** each year, making it one of the most lively and youthful cities in Spain.
- The **University of Salamanca** (1218) is the oldest in Spain and among the oldest in Europe.
- Salamanca was European Capital of Culture (2002); it was here where historical figures such as Miguel de Unamuno, Francisco de Vitoria, Fray Luis de León, Carmen Martín Gaite, Teresa of Jesus, Francisco Salinas, and many others you can discover spent their formative years.
- As the capital of **Iberian ham production**, you can sample Salamanca's incredible gastronomy at one of its restaurants and purchase Iberian cured meats, wines, cheeses, and cakes.
- Salamanca is regarded as one of the quintessential Spanish Renaissance cities, although its distinctive style is Churrigueresque.
- Just **two hours from Madrid**, four hours from Seville or three hours from northern Spain, Salamanca offers a perfect experience at any time of the year.



Salamanca **Cathedral**

Two cathedrals with a history spanning nine centuries. The old Romanesque cathedral, and the new Gothic one

In the surroundings, enjoy the atmosphere of Plaza de Anaya and the tranquillity of Patio Chico.



Ieronimus. **Cathedral Towers**

A unique experience that lets you discover the city from the cathedral towers. The tour offers stunning views of the historic centre and the river, while also allowing visitors to admire the vaults, bells, and architectural details of the cathedrals up close.



Plaza Mayor

An incomparable Baroque agora, a meeting point and social hub for locals and visitors alike. Its unique harmony continues to captivate, featuring 88 arches and numerous sculpted medallions that encapsulate the history of Spain.



Salamanca University

In 1218, King Alfonso IX of León established the University of Salamanca, recognised as the oldest Hispanic university.

Key attractions include the Higher Schools Building with its Plateresque façade, the General Historic Library, the Auditorium, and the classrooms of Fray Luis de León and Unamuno.

▶ Visit the Patio de Escuelas Menores, The Sky of Salamanca, and the Unamuno House Museum.

Roman Bridge

The arches near the city are the only intact, as the others were restored 18th century. This bridge is part of Silver Route.

At the entrance to the bridge, there is a Vettonian stone boar that has been immortalised in the work *El Lazarillo de Tormes*.





House of Shells




This palace stands as one of the finest examples of Spanish Civil Gothic architecture. Its noteworthy features include its windows and the patio and façade elements, adorned primarily with ornamental shells.

Pontifical University



The former Royal College of the Holy Spirit of the Society of Jesus, built in the Baroque style between the 17th and 18th centuries, now houses the Pontifical University. The Church of the Holy Spirit is also known as La Clerecía.

The Baroque cloister hosts the exhibition *Vita Ignatii: Action and Contemplation.*

Scala Coeli is a unique 'stairway to heaven' offering spectacular city panoramas and insights into the history of the Royal College of the Society of Jesus.



San Esteban Convent



Of particular architectural interest are the cloister's vaults, the Plateresque façade, and the Soto staircase. It was in the Oratory that Christopher Columbus first proposed to the Dominicans his idea of reaching the Indies by a new route.

Casa Lis Art Nouveau Art Deco Museum



A decorative arts museum offering a journey through time, from the late 19th century through to the Second World War. Particularly worthy of note is its fascinating colourful stained glass.

Calixto and Melibea Gardens



Gardens of Muslim influence, located beside the ancient wall, where aromatic plants and fruit trees delight the senses. The views are unparalleled.



Monterrey Palace

A splendid example of Spanish Renaissance architecture, with a majestic façade and intricate ornamentation. The palace hosts an impressive collection of Renaissance masterpieces.

La Purísima Church

Italian Baroque in style, it is part of Las Agustinas Convent. One of its treasures is the painting of the Immaculate Conception by José de Ribera.



Archbishop Fonseca School

C/ Fonseca, 4

Like the other university Higher Schools, it originally served as a charitable educational institution, allowing those without financial means to access higher education.



San Vicente Hill Museum

▶ Visit the hillsides of Unseen Salamanca and the archaeological site.

River Tormes

The river, a natural treasure that brings life and beauty to the city. Its banks offer a privileged space for leisure and connecting with nature, featuring peaceful walks, routes, and cultural and tourist activities.

Monterrey Palace

Monterrey Palace is the only palace in Salamanca that houses a royal residence inside, still inhabited today.





La Salina Palace



Calle San Pablo, 18

Founded in the 16th century, its name is due to the fact that it was a salt warehouse until 1880. The building is of Plateresque style and is attributed to Rodrigo Gil de Hontañón.



Anaya Palace



Plaza de Anaya

The so-called Colegio Mayor de Anaya replaced the first Higher School of the University of Salamanca, Colegio de San Bartolomé, founded in 1401. The current building, home to the School of Philology, is one of the few neoclassical structures in Salamanca.

Las Claras Convent. Medieval Painting Museum



The convent museum comprises the lower choir hall, the north gallery of the lower cloister, the upper choir room (ideal for admiring the church and Churriguera's altarpiece), the area above the temple's vaults with a magnificent coffered ceiling, and the viewpoint.



House of Saint Teresa

Calle Condes de Crespo Rascón, 25

Formerly a Carmelite convent for four years, this site now belongs to the Congregation of the Servants of Saint Joseph and is famed for inspiring the phrase 'I live without living in me'.



San Esteban Convent

A stunning example of Renaissance art and the birthplace of international law.

Since its foundation in 1419, the nuns of this convent have dedicated their lives entirely to prayer, study and work. Its beautiful cloister, besides being an aesthetic delight, bears witness to this life of retreat and inner peace.

Monumenta **Salmanticae**

We suggest beginning your visit in this restored church, which explains and interprets all of Salamanca's architectural and urban heritage without having to leave the site.



Casa Lis Art Nouveau Art Deco Museum

The tour of its rooms, featuring nineteen collections, showcases the production of European decorative arts workshops from the Nouveau and Deco periods.

Located in the so-called 'Casa de las Viejas', it houses the collection 'Gadgets to fascinate' by Salamanca film director Basilio Martín Patino: a journey through the captivating devices of moving images that came before the invention of the cinematograph.



Automotive History Museum

A must-visit destination for car enthusiasts, featuring hundreds of valuable exhibits. Highlights include the Hispano Suiza 20/30 HP from 1910, the only car in our country designated as a National Treasure, the Pegaso Z 102, a SpyderSerraSSP, and a Berlineta Saoutchick.

Salamanca Museum

Located in a medieval fortified tower house, set around a beautiful courtyard, it houses unique objects from the convents dissolved by Mendizábal's disentailment legislation.

Anaya Tower

Anaya Tower, or Abrantes Tower as it was formerly known, is a tower-house that was inhabited by the Anaya and Bazán families. Today, it functions as a cultural and exhibition venue.



Salamanca Commerce and Industry Museum

This museum preserves the ingenuity and entrepreneurial initiative of Salamanca's merchants. It still maintains the old cisterns. Visit "The Sounds of Yesteryear", a collection of antique radios that connect us to beloved radio dramas or news and advice shows.



Santo Domingo Exhibition Hall



Calle Arroyo de Santo Domingo, 18

Emerging from the restoration of the 16thcentury Colegio de Santo Domingo de la Cruz, this space now houses the permanent exhibition of Salamanca sculptor Venancio Blanco.





Salamanca **Bullfighting Museum**

A place to showcase and pay tribute to Salamanca's bullfighting and bullfighters. The museum celebrates the ecosystem where the fighting bull is raised, and its importance for the local economy.





San Martín de Tours Church



A Romanesque church erected in the 12th century, as the city was being repopulated. Before the construction of the Plaza Mayor, the area was home to shops, markets, and social events.





Veracruz Church

Campo de San Francisco, 7

A Baroque temple that is the seat of the city's oldest penitential brotherhood. The only building in Salamanca completely adorned in Churrigueresque style.



La Purísima Church

Plaza de las Agustinas

Most notable on the main altar is José de Ribera's painting of the Immaculate Conception. The altarpiece is a masterpiece of Baroque art.



Santo Tomás Cantuariense Church

Calle Rosario, s/n

A unique late Romanesque temple dedicated to Saint Thomas Becket, the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Sancti-Spíritus Church

Ronda de Sancti-Spíritus, 24

Late Gothic temple. It is the sole surviving part of Sancti-Spíritus Convent, founded at the end of the 12th century.





San Marcos Church

Plaza San Marcos, s/n

While its exterior features an unusual circular layout, the temple's interior is even more surprising, with three apses and three naves resembling a basilica.

The archaeological site at Cerro de San Vicente, which marks the origin of the city of Salamanca, houses an extensive archaeological sequence beginning with a settlement from the early Iron Age. The Museum's 'Unseen Salamanca' exhibition explores the city's history, from its earliest settlers and the lost San Vicente Monastery, through to the remnants of the War of Independence.



Botanical Archaeological Park

The site preserves archaeological remains of significant historical value from San Agustín Convent and its Church of San Pedro, as well as the College of Cuenca and its surrounding urban area. The visit allows a virtual view of the lost monumental complex.

Salamanca Cave and Marquis of Villena Tower

It is in this cave, located in the crypt of the former church of San Cebrián and Villena Tower, that legend places the school where the devil taught occult sciences. It is said that the entrance to this other city and its necromantic, alchemical, initiatory university is found here.



Salamanca Walls Interpretation Centre



Archaeological excavations have uncovered a section of the city's impressive defensive system. The centre offers a tour through Salamanca's history, highlighting the importance of its walls as more than mere defensive structures.

Snow Well and remains of San Andrés Convent

A well, more than seven metres deep and covered by a slate vault, where our ancestors stored and preserved snow. The visit provides an opportunity to explore the underground galleries.



Clavero Tower



Calle Consuelo, 34

Its name appears to derive from its construction by Don Francisco de Sotomayor, Key Bearer of the Order of Alcántara, a role that involved safeguarding the keys to the fortresses and the Order's archives.





Salamanca Wall



Paseo Rector Esperabé

La Cerca Vieja, a fortified enclosure of late Roman origin, followed the layout of the ancient Castro wall and was constructed in the Middle Ages.



Jesuitas Park

Avda. de los Jesuitas, Avda. del Aldehuela.

The first major urban park in Salamanca, originating from the Jesuits' Orchard.

Alamedilla Park

One of the most centrally located parks in Salamanca. Dating back to 1863, it emerged from the Enlightenment, reflecting the prevailing interest in nature and leisure as Salamanca's growing society sought an outdoor recreational space.





Colón Park



This space has evolved over the centuries. It was originally surrounded by several palaces: Almarza, Orellana, Anaya de Carabas, Maldonado, and Abrantes, some of which still exist today. Nowadays, it is a green lung at the heart of the city.

The River Tormes

The Tormes represents the flow of time and offers a very attractive walk among poplars, elms, and weeping willows. Its riverside park offers boat rides, a splendid cycling path, park games, and sports along the riverbank.



Calixto and Melibea Gardens



Associated with the literary work 'La Celestina' as one of the likely settings where the lovers from Rojas's play met. Perched atop the wall and sheltered by the cathedral towers, offering a beautiful view of the city.



La Merced Garden



A small garden with river views and stunning sunsets. Used as a fort during the War of Independence, alongside San Cayetano and San

Vicente.
